I am currently Professor of Sociology and Public Policy (Step IX), with an affiliated appointment in the Graduate School of Education. I have had departmental approvals for advancement to Distinguished Professor of Sociology and Public Policy and anticipate campus approval in Spring 2016. I have had long-standing faculty affiliations with the Center for Studies in Higher Education at UC-Berkeley and the Center for the Study of Poverty and Inequality at Stanford University. I have previously held teaching and research appointments at Boston College and Yale University. I have held research appointments at New York University, Boston University, Harvard University, the University of Rome (La Sapienza), the National Institute of Education, and the Huron Institute. My teaching specialties are higher education studies, the sociology of education, educational policy, institutions and organizations, and sociological theory.

## B. ADMINISTRATIVE CAREER

### Vice Provost, Undergraduate Education (2011-present)

As Vice Provost I work with a staff of more than 50 full-time employees and more than 100 peer educators. The Office of Undergraduate Education (UE) is responsible for the Academic Resources Center, the Academy of Distinguished Teachers, the Office of Evaluation and Assessment, Office-Campus Academic Experiences, Summer Sessions, the Office of Undergraduate Research, the University Honors Program, and the University Writing Program. I serve as liaison officer to the Western Association of Schools and Colleges, our regional accreditor. I have also been deeply engaged in helping to solve organizational systems problems on campus and in strategic planning for the campus.

#### Campus-Level Leadership

- *Led Graduation Rate Task Force and Implementation Team*

Chaired task force that produced plan to improve UCR four- and six-year graduation rates by 15% for the entering class of 2017. The report's recommendations included targeted recruitment of business students who are more likely to succeed at UCR; institutionalization of enrollment models to ensure that students have a sufficient supply and the right distribution of course so that they can enroll in 15 units per quarter; allocation of more and higher-quality teaching resources to introductory courses in fall quarter; the consideration of new health-, business- and science and technology policy programs; the development of mandatory and dynamic four-year course planning tools in all of the colleges; a new focus for advising on first-quarter freshmen and early identification of students requiring transition advising; a highly visible "finish-in-four" campaign; and study of possible revisions in financial aid policy to incentivize timely completion. Since the submission of the report, I have been responsible for its implementation.

- *Led Predictive Analytics Work Group*

Currently chairing a work group whose task is to develop predictive analytics to aid advisers to help their students make timely progress to degree and to graduate in four years. The group has made recommendations about a constituency relations management tool and about development of a dynamic course planning tool that allows students to develop "what if" course planning scenarios. In each scenario the tool automatically minimizes the student's time to degree. Campus implementation of these tools is planned for Fall 2016.

- *University Alliance Campus Co-Lead*

University Alliance is a consortium of 12 major U.S. research universities that have formed an "innovation cluster," primarily to equalize and increase the graduation rates of low-income and under-represented minority students. Alliance universities are committed to access, cost

containment, and research excellence. Together with Chancellor Kim Wilcox, I have taken the leading role in facilitating UCR's engagement with the Alliance and working on the Alliance funding proposal that has been funded by five major philanthropic foundations.

- *Led Online Strategic Plan Committee*

Chaired committee charged with providing comprehensive plan for development of UCR online presence in the next decade. Held biweekly meetings to meet goal of producing report that will guide UCR online development by July 2013. Plan adopted by EVC/P and is currently in implementation.

- *Led STEM Outreach Committee*

The campus has had no mechanism for addressing requests from K-12 teachers, schools, and school districts. Committee developed mechanisms for gathering information about current STEM outreach activities, applications for assistance, and review process both for classroom/school assistance and assistance in activities of STEM schools and academies.

- *Led International Student Support and Retention Working Group*

Committee developed an action plan in support of the Chancellor's goal to expand international undergraduate enrollment to 8 to 10 percent by 2014-15. Plan includes new immersion courses, supplemental instruction with ESL component, enhanced advising in the Colleges, and non-academic student support services. Plan adopted by EVC/P and is currently in implementation.

- *Developed Enrollment Model to Ensure Students 15 Units of Credit/Term*

Enrollment growth combined with budget cuts created imbalance between course offerings and student demand. With staff support, developed enrollment model to predict departmental seat requirements each term to meet student demand in both lower and upper-division courses at 15 units per term. Enrollment model has contributed to meeting student demand, particularly in the largest College, the College of Humanities, Arts, and Social Sciences.

- *Led Introductory Mathematics Task Force*

The Task Force examined student skills and motivation, the accuracy of placement tests, TA and instructor preparation, course and room scheduling, group study opportunities, and supplemental instruction programs offered through Academic Resources Center. Report led to improvements in placement and supplemental instruction opportunities, as well as to greater "ownership" of the success of the program by the Department of Mathematics. We are currently revisiting the math curriculum, organization, and delivery, using the task force report as a baseline document.

- *Led Academic Excellence Subcommittee in Development of the Campus Strategic Plan*

This subcommittee was a central element in the development of the campus strategic plan, *UCR 2020*. I served as co-chair of subcommittee with then-Chancellor Tim White. Primary focus was on planning to attain the profile of an AAU member institution. Investigated metrics associated with AAU membership, including counting publications, citations, and awards for every faculty member on campus. Studied actual and potential interdisciplinary groupings. Created faculty survey to examine faculty perceptions of obstacles to achievement of AAU membership goal. Wrote report of subcommittee and three of the six “special topics” report (size and shape of UCR 2020, strategic priority areas, admissions and enrollment management). - *Co-author of UCR 2020: The Campus Strategic Plan*

Served as member of four-person committee responsible for writing and editing the campus strategic plan. Plan built on reports of eight subcommittees and efforts of more than 120 colleagues. Plan currently informs a wide range of decisions on the UCR campus.

#### Division of Undergraduate Education Leadership

- *Designed and Instituted New Program Planning and Evaluation Process*

Replaced *ad hoc* approach to new initiatives with proposal process by unit heads. Proposals required to include budget and assessment. Initiated process for discussing proposals at annual staff retreat at the beginning of fall term. Continued to cultivate a culture of evidence, making resources available to effective programs and redesigning or withdrawing resources from programs that are not meeting their objectives. Each of our programs undergoes evaluation on a 5-year cycle.

- *Founded Office of Undergraduate Research and Chancellor’s Research Fellows*

The Office of Undergraduate Research coordinates annual Undergraduate Research and Creative Activities Symposium, the Undergraduate Research Journal, the Chancellor’s Research Fellowship competition, and the Undergraduate Research Tracking System. I designed and fostered the development of the Chancellor’s Research Fellows (CRF) and Undergraduate Research Tracking System are new activities of UE. CRF is an annual competition for \$5,000 in research support with applications judged by a faculty committee for 13 recipients. We recently developed and deployed an Undergraduate Research Portal to match professors and students.

- *Founded Office of Off-Campus Academic Experiences*

Integrated Education Abroad Program staff, reorganized Summer Study Abroad, and set expanded goals for student participation in off-campus study experiences, including also UCDC and UC in Sacramento programs. Redesigned Summer Study Abroad (SSA). Eight new

programs scheduled for Summer 2014.

- *Initiated Global Issues Forum*

Formed student-led committee, with faculty oversight, to plan large-scale events on international affairs as part of internationalization effort of the campus. Events will include debates, panels, and lectures and will begin in Fall 2015.

- *Expanded Academically Enriched Internships*

We began an expansion of academically enriched internships in 2013-14, utilizing skill inventories for students matched to internship opportunities offered by the Riverside Community Foundation. We walked the internships to determine that they were college level and we matched students to internship opportunities based on the work and the students's skill set. We expanded in 2014-15 by providing an incentive program to six departments for offering at least 12 high-quality academically integrated internships each year.

- *Initiated Senior Capstone Experiences Initiative*

Led mapping of current capstone experiences and unit counts in majors. Developed plan to encourage departments to institute capstone experiences based on targeted reduction in major requirements. Developed application for departments to gain capstone designation.

- *Formed Rhodes-Marshall Committee*

Committee provides a full-year program to prepare students for success in competitions for prestigious scholarships and fellowships. The campus has seen a steady increase in fellowship winners following institutionalization of the Rhodes-Marshall Committee and the year-long preparation program, including 3 Coros, 3 Strauss, 2 Goldwaters, and 10 Gilmans in 2014-15.

- *Created "Leadership Pathway" Program*

"Pathways" link academic courses and co-curricular activities in four designated areas: leadership, entrepreneurship, civic engagement, and the creative process. In the first round of funding, we funded a "Leadership Pathway" program, which began as three inter-linked courses in Winter term 2014. First UCR Leadership Fellows Spring Reception, June 2015.

- *Instituted R'Courses Program*

UCR has been one of the few UC campuses without student-initiated courses. With my support, UE developed a proposal for student-run "R'Courses." The proposal was approved by the Senate. UE is forming a faculty governing board and seeking faculty mentors for the first

R' Courses to be offered in Spring term 2014.

- *Instituted Writing Support Program*

Created robust pilot program to work instructors who wish to help students improve writing skills. Writing support staff work with course instructors to tailor support to course assignments. Preliminary evaluations indicate good usage and improvements in student writing.

- *Contributed to Redesign of Drop-In Tutoring and Early Assist Programs*

Two ARC programs have been targeted for redesign based on careful evaluations showing no effects on participants as compared to matched non-participants. Drop-in tutoring has been redesigned for 30 minute sessions and with a new training program for tutors. Early Assist has been redesigned to resemble Intercollegiate Athletics advising, but with a focus on “at risk” UCR students. Students are required to meet regularly with peer educators who pose questions about study time, study habits, class attendance, and problems in understanding assignments. Initial evaluation of the Fall 2013 pilot showed encouraging results.

- *Revived and Expanded Activities of the Academy of Distinguished Teachers*

Added six new members of Academy of Distinguished Teachers and supervised development of mentoring program and integration into UE. Revived Scholarship of Teaching and Learning colloquium series organizing faculty-led colloquia. Based on experience with a one-time “master teacher” program conducted by Prof. Harvey Brightman, with the members of the Academy of Distinguished Teachers, I designed (and taught in) a “teaching excellence” seminar to provide basic training and practice in teaching for new faculty members. Began “Conversations with Master Teachers” roundtables Fall 2015.

- *Led General Education Assessment and Reform*

Committee conducted assessment of opportunities for undergraduates to develop quantitative literacy and oral presentation skills. Committee also evaluated University Writing Program. With committee support, developed recommendations to address “soft spots” in general education curriculum focusing first on opportunities for oral communication. Currently working on oral communications through introduction of new “O” courses.

### **Principal Researcher and Co-Director, SERU Survey and Consortium (2006-present)**

SERU (Student Experience in the Research University) is a census survey of undergraduates that now encompasses 24 major public research universities in the United States and 11 international partners. The Survey is similar in design to the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) but tailored to reflect the educational and co-curricular experiences of students attending research universities. Survey produces data on hundreds of thousands of students’ experiences in public

- *Management of SERU Survey and Consortium*

Responsible with UC Berkeley colleagues John Aubrey Douglass and Gregg Thomson and University of Minnesota colleague Ron Huesman, Jr. for management of the SERU Survey and Consortium. Chairman of the SERU Consortium Board beginning in March 2015.

- *Co-chair, Design and Content Work group*

Responsible for recommending changes in survey questions and survey delivery for consortium approval. These changes have been adopted for the Spring 2016 administration of the survey. Wrote essay, "Research University SPACES: The Multiple Purposes of an Undergraduate Education," that served as the theoretical framework for survey redesign.

- *Participant in Redesign of SERU Graduate Student Survey*

Helped to design work groups and advisory committees for redesign of the SERU Graduate Student Survey. Developed survey questions and helped to market to national AAU and international partners.

- *Designer of Mathematics Experience Module and Co-Curricular Learning Items*

Wrote the mathematics experience module which was piloted in a recent administration of the SERU Survey. Results will be used for program improvement efforts on member institution campuses. Developed co-curricular learning items for the 2014 Survey administration.

- *Co-convener, Annual SERU Symposium*

Jointly responsible for annual symposium in which research on the student experience is presented and discussed to SERU Consortium participants. The symposia also address policy issues of interest to member institutions.

### **Director, Colleges & Universities 2000 Project (2000-2014)**

I was funded by the National Science Foundation and two philanthropies for more than a decade to study organizational and cultural change in U.S. four-year colleges and universities. - *Produced and Updated Institutional Data Archive and College Catalog Study Databases*

The Institutional Data Archive on American Higher Education (IDA) is a panel study beginning in AY 1970-71 with coding at five-year intervals through AY 2010-11. Data consists of a stratified random sample of 385 four-year colleges and universities measured on more than 2000 variables, drawn from 21 separate sources, including institutional characteristics, financial data, student and faculty composition data, and a wide range of other data. Includes survey responses of presidents and provosts in AY 2000-01 and AY 2012-13. The College Catalog Study (CCS) database is a panel study beginning in AY 1975-76 with coding at five-year intervals through AY 2010-11 on a subset of 292 IDA institutions. CCS includes coding of major academic units (schools and colleges), departments in arts and sciences, departments in professional schools, degree-granting interdisciplinary programs, and general education requirements. These databases are currently archived at the University of Michigan's Inter-collegiate Center for Political and Social Research (ICPSR).

- *Expanded Registered User Base*

We have increased our user base from under 1000 at the time of first releases in the mid-2000s to more than 230 today.

- *Research on Organizational and Cultural Change in U.S. Higher Education*

The project team has published more than 30 papers and dissertations on such topics as the rise of the “practical arts,” declining academic fields, the growth and locations of interdisciplinary, degree-granting programs, competing models of general education, the competitiveness of public research universities, and market forces as an explanation of the rise and fall of academic fields. ### **Associate Dean. College of Humanities, Arts, and Social Sciences (2007-2011)**

I supervised a staff of 27 college advisors and a student affairs manager. I expanded the responsibilities of the office to include efforts to enhance teaching and learning in the College. After two years of unplanned over-enrollments, I became involved in the redirection of admissions policy and modeling student demand for courses. I was asked to take leadership positions on campus committees involved in solving preparatory education problems, admissions and enrollment management, and strategic planning.

- *Led Effort to Professionalize Academic Advising*

Created a professional advising series requiring a BA degree and began reclassification of advisors. Wrote document on “meaning of professional advising.” Provided new training to College advisors and created efficiencies through creation of inter-departmental advising units. Created a more professional environment in the College office by redesigning the lobby and introducing an electronic sign-in and scheduling system for the students.



- *Improved Student Academic Affairs Communication with Students*

Redesigned the Student Affairs website, by including video FAQs and useful information for students and parents. Completed work on the advisor handbook. Improved the summer orientation series, which had included too little time for students to understand their majors and to register for courses. Prepared materials to justify awards for outstanding contributions to advising.

- *Created Video Features Highlighting Outstanding Students & Faculty*

Created a web video feature, *Mind's Alive*, to recognize high-achieving students in the College. Feature included 5-minute clip of the students' work and 5-minute clip of an interview with the students. Conducted all interviews. After posting features on You-Tube, monthly hits to the College website more than doubled from under 900,000 to nearly 1.9 million. Created a similar web video feature, *Scenes from a Classroom*, to recognize the work of outstanding teachers in the College. - *Created CHASS Education Pond*

Launched a teaching and learning blog, the CHASS Education Pond ("throw in an observation and see if it ripples"). - *Created and Taught in CHASS Leadership Programs*

Taught HASS 100 as a seminar-style course for which students applied for admission. Read and discussed classic literature on leadership. Reorganized “Introduction to College Life” course to put greater emphasis on academic skills development. Served as co-PI of \$500 million FIPSE grant to expand and evaluate College first-year learning communities.

- *Initiated Improvements in College Recruitment, Admissions, and Enrollment Management*

Encouraged formation of Enrollment Management Council to address issues of over-enrollment and admission standards. Served as vice-chair of the Council under the Provost. Began modeling enrollment to ensure students had opportunities to enroll in 15 units per quarter.

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
